The Concept

- EPR is an environmental policy approach in which a **producer's responsibility** for a product is **extended** to the **post-consumer stage** of a product's life cycle
- An EPR policy is characterized by:
 - the shifting of responsibility (physically and/or economically; fully or partially) upstream towards the producer, away from municipalities; and
 - the provision of incentives for producers to consider environmental consequences when designing their products.



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

ADF: Advanced Disposal FeeUCTS: Upstream Combination Tax/Subsidy

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




EPR in the MENA region



Regulated = at least partial regulatory framework exists



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Most successful EPR systems globally

What qualifies them?

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- Implemented a long time ago, up to 30 years
- Benefit from an effectively enforced, updated regulatory framework
- **Binding** quantitative **targets**
- Strong collection and treatment infrastructure
- Adequate technical standards
- Involvement of all stakeholders in the system with clear responsibilities

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- Clear system financing
- Solid data management capability

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Generally systems are operated by the private sector

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Most successful EPR systems globally What qualifies them?

• Consider existing small formal collectors and recyclers, as they represent an active actor and to avoid any opposition to the system

• Ensure transparency is absolute necessary for effective government oversight

• EPR concept **should be adapted** to the situation of each country and ist characteristics...

Consider ecodesign criterias and restrictions on hazardous substances

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EPR in the MENA region



How is the situation different?

- Most systems are in the process of being implemented (exception Tunisia)
- Most frameworks are incomplete or in need of overhauling
- General lack of binding quantitative targets
- Collection and recycling infrastructure is lacking
- Lack of data management capability
- System financing may compete with other mechanisms
- Unsustainable financing of the systems
- Strong empowerment of the public sector to implement EPR
- Significant role of the informal sector without being in the system

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

Realistic timelines have to be considered

- EPR is a journey, it takes time, and many iterations to refine the system
 - Countries like Germany and France, which EPR systems date back to the early 90's overhauled their system as late as 2019 and 2020, respectively → it is a continuous process
 - Having started later, MENA countries can however leapfrog and avoid mistakes made by their precursors




- Relevant infrastructure requires time to build
 - An enforced regulatory framework, with clear assignment of roles and responsibilities and binding targets is required to provide visibility and legal security to investors

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Short to mid term horizon



With structuring impact

- No regulatory framework can be considered complete in the region, for an efficient enforcement of EPR
 - Some have to be drafted from A to Z
 - Some have to completed
 - Some have to be overhauled



- · Data collection systems provide visibility for planning and monitoring
 - Producer registry for identification and reporting of products entering the market
 - Operations reporting and targets fulfilment monitoring

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Specific regional aspects Competing finance flows

- Pre-existing tax-based mechanisms may impair acceptance of new EPR fees due to a double payment
- EPR financing needs to be secured for success
 - through direct assignment of EPR fees to operations, or
 - ringfencing necessary legacy monies to the fulfilment of EPR goals
- Stakeholder dialogue is required to overcome this situation where applicable
- Demonstration of the long-term effectiveness of the EPR model vs. taxation models could be presented

Public sector empowerment

- While most EPR systems globally are run by private sector operators (under the supervision of the regulator), many MENA countries have opted for a full public management of the system (playing the role of regulation, controlling, supervision and operation)
- However multiple factors may restrict the ability of the public sector to implement and develop EPR operationally: human and financial resources, technical capacity, engagement rules...
- Alternative scenarios could be evaluated for enhanced effectiveness:
 - PPP
 - Outsourcing to private operators of part or all of the EPR processes
 - Private sector initiatives in addition or as a replacement (if in addition, coordination is needed)

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Specific regional aspects

Integration of Informal sector

- A large number of informally organized people in the region depend on waste collection and processing to ensure their livelihood
- An EPR system built against or without them is likely to be combatted
- On the other hand, the EPR system may play a role in the integration of the informal sector, for instance through enforcement of a more secure remuneration models and a clear organizational concept
- The EPR system can also set incentives to the informal sector for collecting low value plastic waste, either door to door, on the street or during beach cleaning activities

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How can the Tourism Sector support EPR

In the three TouMaLi project countries, EPR is at various stages of development

 However, the project is building for the tourism sector a pilot waste handling infrastructure in the partnering countries, hotels creating initial traction

- The collection, sorting and preparation model can be a blueprint for further deployment
- Specific plastics collection and handling costs can then be passed on to obligated producers

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
