## Why management of Marine Litter is important?



#### For the environment and us

Threat to fauna



Damages to ships and equipment



Introduction of invasive species



Safety and health risk



Habitat destruction



Loss of aesthetic



- Decrease the environmental impact on ecosystems
- Secure the proper functioning of ecosystem services
- Avoid health and safety risks
- Decrease our carbon footprint by integrating marine litter management into circular economy concepts























## Why management of Marine Litter is important?





Decrease impact on local economies (fisheries, tourism)

#### For the tourism industry

44% of the Gross Value Added 63% of the employment in Europe (European Commission, 2022) 58% of consumers more aware of the environment (WTTC, 2020).



- 40% annual income (Zielinski et al. 2019).



+ US\$120 million by eliminating litter (NOAA, 2019).

## Linking monitoring to management

Monitoring is the repeated measurement of a characteristic (here marine litter) of the environment, or of a process, in order to detect a trend in space or time. (GESAMP 2019)

Indicator 22: Trends in the amount of litter washed ashore and/or deposited on coastlines.

Indicator 23: Trends in the amount of litter in the water column including microplastics and ON the seafloor. (INTEGRATED MONITORING AND ASSESSMENT PROGRAMME OF THE MEDITERRANEAN SEA AND COAST AND RELATED ASSESSMENT CRITERIA, 2017)

## Measures to reduce beach litter Linking monitoring to management



Higher priority



**Prevention** 

Avoid or stop the damage from occurring



Mitigation

Decrease the negative impact of pollution



Remediation

Repair a damage by removing pollutants

### Beach cleaning not a long term solution!



Removes litter from the beach
Raises awareness (when
involving volunteers)
Simple when not using machinery

- End-of-pipe measure
  Litter collected complex to recycle
  Costly
  Machinery can harm the habitats
  Gives sense of relaxation
- → Beach cleaning is a remediation measure but not real cost-efficient and sustainable long-term solution.





















#### What can the HORECA sector do?

Provide staff training on waste reduction, waste sorting, management, etc

Reduce unnecessary packaging (e.g. by buying in bulks for less packaging)










## Linking monitoring to management
